- Pumpkin carving!






- Create autumn-inspired outfits!



# French Program in France

### **Program?**

This summer we went with Greenheart Travel, to attend a two week language camp in France, more specifically Arcachon, which is located in the south of France, near Bordeaux.

### Why did you attend?

We decided to attend the program because we're both very passionate about learning the French language and wanted a chance to experience it in the real world with real French speakers.

### Application?

The application was fairly simple. Most of it consisted of formalities like your name, address, contact info, etc.



The program leader reviews this and once you are accepted, you will be prompted to fill out another, more lengthy application for your host family placement. They asked a variety of questions pertaining to you as a person



### What did you do at the program?

Each morning we had about 3 hours of French class, which focused on speaking and comprehension rather than reading, writing, and grammar. Afterwards, we would all eat lunch together outside and then split off into our various activities. When signing up with their organization, some students had the opportunity to pick surfing as their activity (Greenheart doesn't offer this). Others participated in activities such as paddle boarding, visiting the beach, canoeing, going to Bordeaux, etc. (which is what we did).

After activities we would sometimes stay in Arcachon with our friends to grab dinner, go to the beach, or browse shops nearby. Besides this, you might also participate in some things with your host family such as attending a festival or fair happening in the city.



# Would you recommend this program to others?

We would definitely recommend programs like this where you are able to immerse yourself in the culture and language of wherever you're visiting. The best part was the diversity in the program as there were Austrians, Germans, Americans, Italians, and Spanish students. We'd recommend it for students that are fairly independent and are genuinely interested in whatever they'll be studying during their time abroad. We would also recommend looking at other organizations that offer this kind of trip.

# Harvard Pre-College Program

### Program?

My friend Afrah and I had the chance to attend Harvard Pre-College Program - a 2-week academic course of our choice at Harvard University. 


### **Application?**

In order to attend the program, a rigorous application process was necessary. We found that the process somewhat mimicked the US college application process, so it's a good opportunity for anyone interested in applying to the States. The application consisted of a reference letter and a few teacher recommendations, a grade transcript and a supplementary application consisting of 4 essays. The essays mainly asked about extracurricular involvement and commitment to academics. Applications open in mid-fall, to find out more about the program visit the Harvard Pre-College website.

### What did you do at the program?

The course I took was called the Power and Politics of Fairy Tales and it dealt with deconstructing the psychological, social, and political aspects of fairytales and fantasy fiction. In the class, we learned a lot about how to perfect the 'fairy-tale style' in our writing and how to make stories resonate. I would recommend this course to anyone who is socially-conscious, passionate about activism, and loves writing and fairy tales! . We also got an inside look into Harvard student life as my teacher was a PhD student.




Afrah attended a forensics course called Scientific Evidence in The American Judicial System which dove into specific poisons and their relevance to court. The course beautifully combined science and legal studies to show how interdependent they are. She had multiple in-class debates about certain cases and wrote reports and presentations. She explored scientific evidence in X-rays, polygraphs, and fingerprints and considered the relationship to interrogation techniques in court.



### Would you recommend this program?

We would recommend this program to absolutely anyone who wants to study in the US or wants to expand their horizons in terms of careers! You do not need to have amazing grades to get into the program, just good essay writing skills and creativity. Being able to surround ourselves with such successful and determined high school students allowed us to truly think about what we want to accomplish after high school.
