WELCOME!

Take Our Kids to Work Day is an experiential learning opportunity for Grade 9 and Secondary III (Quebec) students across Canada since 1994. Now hosted by the Students Commission of Canada, this day offers youth the chance to see the world of work firsthand, explore a variety of careers and sectors, and look at what skills are important to thrive in the world of work.

This year, on **Wednesday, November 1**, students, caregivers, educators and workplaces will have options for participating in diverse, inclusive and accessible career exploration on Take Our Kids to Work Day 2023!

The theme for Take Our Kids to Work 2023, *Everyone Belongs Here*. The return to in-person experience, featuring diverse experiences and representatives, all students, regardless of their circumstances, will be empowered to see the value they hold and power they possess in making decisions about their future. Through it all, the goal is to ignite students' curiosity and open the door for them to see what is possible for their future.

HOW TO GET THE MOST OUT OF THE DAY THAT LASTS A LIFETIME!

Wherever students are – at home, in school, or with a caregiver – you can build your own day based on what fits with your schedule. Families can participate in any of the following ways:

AT WORK

Youth can take part in activities and events organized and hosted by their caregiver's employer.

Tip: Caregivers, check with your employer to see if they are participating in Take Our Kids to Work 2023. Share <u>Take Our Kids to Work Resources</u> with the appropriate people in your organization and encourage them to learn more!

AT SCHOOL

Teachers can lead students through the Take Our Kids to Work Day, which may include viewing or assigning as homework pre-recorded sessions and other fun, career-related activities in the classroom, before, on and after Wednesday, November 1.

Tip: Check with your child's teacher to see what their plans are for incorporating Take Our Kids to Work 2023 in the classroom.

AT HOME

Caregivers and their children can participate directly from home in the Take Our Kids to Work Day. More activities will be provided in this guide.



PART A: BEFORE PREPARING YOUR CHILD FOR THE WORK EXPERIENCE



Whether your child will be taking part in the Take Our Kids to Work day in your workplace or in school, engaging in some conversation and activities before the day can help to set the stage.

What can your child expect on Take Our Kids to Work Day?

The following checklist outlines what your child can expect during Take Our Kids to Work 2023. Review the list with your child before November 1.

 - Ask employers questions about the organization, their role, and the industry, field or sector – and in some cases, get a virtual tour of workplaces.
 - Engage in fun, interactive, career-related activities, workshops and demonstrations.
 - Gain a deeper knowledge of today's workforce and the skills they need to be successful
 in the world of work.

Pre-activity #3: Operation Dream Quest

Now is your chance to think through your goals, dreams and the change you are going to create. When your family or friends look back on this time right now, what do you hope they will remember about you? What do you need to learn or do to accomplish your mission?







If you are welcoming your child in your workplace and there are no specific activities in place, here are some ideas for making the most out of the Take Our Kids to Work experience.

The Students Commission of Canada produced seven unique Take Our Kids to Work Day session recordings. These components may be used by workplace hosts, by teachers in their classrooms, or by parents with child at home. More students will be able to access more diverse workplace experiences than ever before!

The pre-recorded sessions are designed to be:

- **Modular**: You can select which session(s) you want to watch and include all or some in your day. Each session is designed to be up to 45 minutes to be compatible with your schedule.
- **Flexible**: Each session will be available not only throughout the day, but even after November 1st to complement the journey that is career exploration.
- Inspiring and fun!

Below, you will find a short description of each of the sessions to help you select the ones that will be best suited for the day.



How to Access the Recorded Sessions and Virtual Event

Everyone Belongs Here!

This cornerstone virtual event is an uplifting way to kick off the day, bringing a message of purpose and belonging to students, their parents and educators alike. The 45-minute pre-recorded video sets the stage for a great Take Our Kids to Work Day and is available afterwards to use as part of your regular curriculum. RBC Olympian Larissa Franklin will share her journey in high-performance sport and her career emphasizing resilience and self-discovery. Students from across Canada will ask questions and a panel of experts from diverse industries will provide their insights and tips. Available in English and French.

Theme sessions

These 45-minute videos feature seven different career themes., Hosted by dynamic and interactive industry experts, they offer more options than ever before for students to encounter numerous professionals, sectors and industries. Each session is available for viewing throughout the day, and after the day. Available in English and French.

Take Our Kids to Work Day Live!

All day November 1, 2023, your employees, visiting students and their families can drop-in to a casual coast-to-coast live stream event. Ask questions of **Career Advisors**. Share stories of discoveries from

workplaces with other students and employers from across Canada. Moderated in English and French.

Discovering your Talents in the 21st Century The Art of Work today, tomorrow and forever

Dive into the world of 21st-century skills and their relevance in today's job market. New jobs, new careers are being created every day. Your talents, your skills can lead you to success in more jobs than perhaps anyone knows. Discover the key skills and competencies that employers seek in today's workforce or kick-start you into your own business. This session offers insights into how to discover and strengthen your talents and skills every year you are in high school, through work, volunteering and travel. Panelists will share their stories of discovering and harnessing their talents, moving from building one business, to another and then another. Discover how to align your unique strengths and talents with jobs and careers that energize you. Discover how you can travel, within and outside of Canada with programs that prepare students for the challenges of the future. The session highlights various success stories and showcases real-life examples of young and older individuals who have honed their 21st-century skills to excel in their careers. Panelists will respond to youth-submitted video questions, providing personalized insights and advice to inspire and empower young participants on their career journeys.

Plum is a Talent Platform, that provides employers data-driven insights to empower individuals to find career opportunities that align with their unique strengths and talents. Shad Canada offers a month-long summer program in 22 universities across Canada focused on STEAM and entrepreneurship for grade 10 and 11 students. International Experience Canada (IEC) offers Canadians the opportunity to work and travel abroad. submitted questions, addressing specific inquiries and inspiring participants to consider careers in the green economy. Hear from Rodney, whose work for social change as a teenager taught him skills that led him from a heavy equipment operator to a successful management career in the oils and how he now balances two worlds, protecting and preserving the environment in his reserve and working for change in industry.



Diversifying the Creative Journey The Art, Media, and Design Industry

This session focusses on art, media, and design careers. Explore the diverse and dynamic world of creative industries and learn about the exciting opportunities they offer. Engage in discussions with experts and professionals from the art, media, and design sectors, gaining valuable insights into their journeys and experiences. Discover the power of creativity, storytelling, and innovation in these industries and how they shape our culture and society. This session will also provide an interactive element where panelists respond to youth video-submitted questions, offering personalized advice and encouragement to aspiring young creatives.

Here are four activities families may complete following Take Our Kids to Work Day. These activities allow youth to reflect on their day and identify what they learned.

Post-activity #1: Take Our Kids to Work Day reflection

Engage in a discussion about their Take Our Kids to Work Day experience and encourage your child to share highlights of the day (e.g., a presentation that was made, quest speaker, their favourite activity, etc.).

On the Goals & Expectations worksheet completed prior to Take Our Kids to Work Day (see pre-activity #1 in this guide), have your child list three things that they learned during their workplace experience as well as reflect and assess whether they met their goals for Take Our Kids to Work Day.

Post-activity #2: Dream job

Encourage your child to creatively describe their dream jobs and the five skills they need to do these jobs. You can even refer back to the Values activity (Pre-activity #2) done prior to the day.

You may want to provide a list of the global competencies (below) as a starting point for what types of skills youth may include.

Students can present their ideas through a poem, song, rap, infomercial, etc. or simply discuss it at dinner time. They are also encouraged to show a photograph or drawing representing their dream jobs.
